There's been a lot of activity in Historic Pella Trust since our March newsletter! We were notified that the Soul Sleeper's Church has been placed on the National Register of Historic places. We are proud of this distinction and are grateful to William C. Page for his efforts to bring this to completion. The Coal Ridge Church has also been successfully added to the National Register, and a celebration was held on Sunday, September 2 with a large congregation for a morning worship service led by the Rev. Robert De Young, a picnic under a tent at noon, and an afternoon unveiling of the plaque in a ceremony complete with music, an address by William C. Page, and a recognition of persons once members of the church, and descendants of past members.

We learned over the summer that the Old City Hall building will also be the subject of the study prerequisite to being nominated for the National Register of Historic Places. We are very excited and pleased to note this plan, and will be supportive of every effort to preserve and find new life for this grand building – an important part of the Pella heritage.

We have also completed a DSL(digital subscriber line) hook-up to serve our computer for e-mail and internet access. We are working on a web site to be up and running in the near future! Previews of what's to come are indeed exciting!

Coming attractions: This year's Garden Club Tour of Homes features the charming Victorian house at the corner of Liberty and East Third Street presently owned by Abe and Phyllis Willems. It was built around 1890 by A. N. Kuyper of the Kuyper Lumber Company and is one of Pella's older, very well preserved treasures. This is a new dimension for the November 29 and 30 Tour of Homes you won't want to miss. If you couldn't attend the Coal Ridge plaque unveiling, another opportunity to see it proudly displayed at the entrance will be at the annual Coal Ridge Carol Sing which will take place on December 9 at 6:30 p.m. Come for the warmest, coziest and friendliest of Christmas celebrations! #### Coal Ridge Community Church and Museum

#### HISTORY OF COAL RIDGE CHURCH

A small mining community called Coalport was settled in 1840 bringing in miners from Pennsylvania, Virginia, Kentucky and North Carolina to develop strip mines for the "black gold" along the Des Moines River. In 1852 the citizens of Coalport built a small frame building to house a school and to be used as a church. Soon this tiny building became the center for social events. As times changed the children were sent to school in Knoxville and the small building detoriated from lack of use, until 1860 when the citizens constructed a wooden church this one built on a foundation of hand hewn stone. This small church accommodated the congregation until October 11, 1908 when a fire erupted and the structure burned to the ground. The members decided immediately to rebuild, and a dedication service was held on February 23, 1909, when the doors opened to welcome the parishioners to their new home.

In 1980 the Ladies' Aid group undertook to restore the old building, their goal was to retain the original character while preserving its rich heritage. In May 1991 the restoration was complete and a celebration was held to rededicate the renewed church. The Coal Ridge Church Ladies' Aid was organized on March 22, 1913 and still functions to this day.

#### PLACEMENT OF COAL RIDGE COMMUNITY CHURCH ON THE NATIONAL REGISTER CELEBRATION, SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 2, 2007

William C. Page, public historian from Des Moines was the featured speaker at the dedication service. Known to friends as Will Page, he worked tirelessly tackling the enormous amount of work necessary to place the Coal Ridge Church and Cemetery on the National Register of Historic Places. Indepth research, documentation plus defending the project before a State Panel and finally getting it sent to the National Board are part of the long process that takes years to accomplish. Will Page accomplished all of this in record time and a special thank you was warmly extended to Will by those attending the celebration.

The large congregation attending the service was blessed by a beautiful September day and enjoyed good food and fellowship under a large tent where the guests could comfortably enjoy the delicious fried chicken and potato salad picnic catered by Central College.

A celebration of music by a hand-bell quartet from Second Reformed Church opened the dedication service. Rev. Robert DeYoung gave a welcome and invocation followed by everyone singing the Coal Ridge Church rededication hymn written by Joyce Kuyper, set to the tune, 'Love Divine, All Loves Excelling'.

Will Page spoke on the topic "What the National Register of Historic Places Designation Means and how it was accomplished".

Handouts of four old-fashioned hymns were distributed and the crowd lustily belted out these familiar hymns. This was followed by the Central College Chamber Singers with Mark Babcock, director.

Davis Folkerts, accompanied by Kris DeWild, led a celebration choir in the singing of three anthems ending with "For the Beauty of the Earth."

David Franklin, whose family attended Coal Ridge church for many generations, had the honor of unveiling the National Register of Historic Places plaque. Everyone then moved outside where Rev. Robert DeYoung attached the plaque to the left side of the front doors.

#### Wyatt Earp's Boyhood Home at Pella's Historical Village by Ellie Gosselink



Wyatt Earp's boyhood home, originally known as the Van Spanckeren home, is located in Pella's Historical Village. It is a grand example of the *importance* of saving old structures. In 1966 the Pella Historical Society saw a crucial need to save this historic home and it became the nucleus of a half-block long historical complex that has grown into the Historical Village we know today. For 27 years the Historical Village has put Pella on the map as we display our proud heritage for local residents as well as for visitors who come from around the world to enjoy our unique museum and embrace our 'touch of Holland'.

Wyatt Earp's boyhood home took on new status when a popular 1950's TV series personified the life and times of Wyatt Earp bringing his fame as a gun-slinging western marshal into prominence. Movies, many based on the showdown between cattle rustlers and the Earp brothers, pushed his fame higher into focus as many Americans became enamored with the strength and integrity of this now famous Marshall. Although Wyatt Earp was born in Monmouth, Illinois on March 19, 1848, his family moved to a farm seven miles northeast of Pella in March of 1850 on 160 acres which was a land grant to his father based on his service in the Mexican war. Wyatt was two years old at this time.

In November 1859 the Earp family rented the Van Spanckeren home and lived there until May of 1864 when the family left for California, settling in San Bernardino. Wyatt Earp was sixteen when his family left Iowa.

Wyatt grew to be a handsome six foot, hard-working man. He was known for his quiet good-natured ways that belied his physical prowess. Throughout his career the stories of his fairness to carry out the law and his gun-fighting expertise had become legend. In 1881 his fame came to a climax when Wyatt and his two brothers, then known as the Fighting Earps arrived in Tombstone, Arizona. They along with Doc Holliday fought the McLaurys and Clantons in the historic gun fight at the O.K. Corral blazing their way into legendary fame.

There are no guns in the gun room of the Wyatt Earp home that were owned or shot by Wyatt Earp, but what is known is that he spent his formative years living in Pella growing up in a community of hard —working, church-going folks who lived by God's laws. Honesty and integrity were the foundation on which the citizens of Pella strived to live their lives, and they took pride in their commitment to be upstanding American citizens, thus setting a good example for the youth of Pella as they grew through their teen-age years.

#### Christmas Holiday Magic

Pella's **Historical Village** is currently being transformed into a wonderland of Christmas as it is lavishly decorated for the 2007 holiday season by volunteers who delight in decorating each room under the guidance of Patsy Sadler.

During this Holiday season treat your family to a visit to the Pella Historical Village and make it a point to visit the Wyatt Earp boyhood home along with all twenty historic buildings ablaze with glorious decorations. Enjoy a warm drink and cookie at the museum's bakery. Chances are you will meet your friends and neighbors as you wander through the twenty buildings, warmly decorated with lights and garland to delight young and old alike.

## 'Pella Weekblad' Newspaper By Bob Klein





In 1860 Henry Nevenesh started printing the Pella Weekblad, a weekly newspaper that was popular for many years and is now an important part of Pella's heritage. It was printed in a workroom of the Neyenesh house on Columbus Street. The printing room was located on the south side of the house, indicated by the second story window in the old photo pictured above. It was printed in the Dutch language and was very popular with the Dutch-speaking citizens. Perhaps I am one of the few people who still use this old paper for accurate research. I find that the use of the Dutch phrasing in the personal ads as well as in the ads placed by Pella businesses are a delight to read. It helps me maintain my current use of the Dutch language that I had learned to read many years ago when the Weekblad was spread out on our kitchen table. I, along with my grandfather, Ike Neels (who gave me considerable help) read the Weekblad together.

One of the highlights of the *Weekblad* was the publication of all the births and deaths printed in the final issue of the year. I still get a lump in my throat when I read the old December 1918 report. Pella was touched by the deadly 1918 flu epidemic as it lost many citizens, including my grandmother Anna Sterrenberg Neels, at the young age of 44.

The personal news was outstanding as Pella citizens and businesses were called upon for their input each week.

In 1909 Henry Neyenesh sold the *Weekblad* to the Boland family. They moved the newspaper office to 837 Broadway (pictured). Harry 'Tromps' Boland published the paper until the 1930's. Many people I remember sat in the right front window in the 837 Broadway office as they edited the paper. Some that come to mind are Dan Dieleman, Henry Johnson, M. Groendyk, Mr. Van Der Meulen (with this magnifying glass bending over a copy of the printed paper). Marion DeZwarte ran the big linotype machine which cast molten lead type used to set the paper. Tuffy Roelofsen was Tromp Boland's assistant. It was a great and unique Pella newspaper who copies I still treasure today.

The Weekblad ran train schedules (as the one pictured to the right) along with markets, church schedules and many articles that kept the citizens advised of what was happening in Pella.

#### Annual Meeting


